LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

What should we do with the weeds?

Jesus put before them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?" He answered, "An enemy has done this." The slaves said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" But he replied, "No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!

Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

This parable reminds me of the fields of linseed that are growing between Mears Ashby and Sywell. As I walk through the fields, I can see weeds of various kinds flourishing amongst the linseed plants - rising above them, sheltering beneath them.

It's tempting to step off the path and pull up the weeds. And yet - if I did, I would - perhaps - do more harm than good to the linseed plants by trampling on them and/or uprooting them with the weeds. In nature, weeds can be a good thing. On a recent walk, I saw a bumble bee enjoying the little purple flowers on one of the weeds. So, maybe, Jesus is right to say that the weeds should be allowed to flourish.

And what are the weeds in Jesus' parable? Well - for the disciples, they are the ones who will refuse to listen to God's offer of salvation, and - instead - will turn on them.

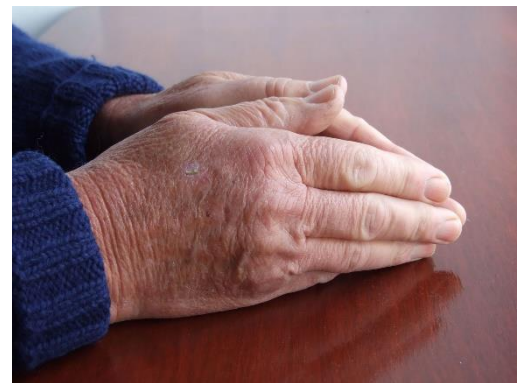
It reminds us that there are bad people in our world today; some who seek to do harm to others.



What does God want us to do about them? First, he wants us to trust in his justice. Nothing escapes his notice. In the fullness of God's time, evil will receive its own just rewards. Second, he is inviting us to pray about what God wants us to do. How can our love and loving actions ease the pain and suffering, the injustice and intolerance we see? How can we be his voice in the world today?

A Prayer of Response

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace;

Also, the parable is a symbol of our daily lives. If your life is the field in Jesus' parable, where is God's love flourishing in you and in what you do? What aspects of your life feel like they are in need of God's healing love? Offer them to him. Remember - all of us struggle with one or more of his Spirit's fruit. We can only become the people he would love us to be through the power of his love.

Sometimes, God uses our weaknesses, our failures and our struggles to bless the lives of others. He takes our weeds and offers them as a source of inspiration to those who feel like they are worthless. Simon Peter is a great example of this. He fails time and time again yet Jesus picks him up, dusts him off and sets him back on the road to becoming one of the Church's early leaders. He does not give up on him. Or, reject him. If his weeds (his weaknesses) could be used to spread God's love, I wonder, how might God use yours? How is he already using them?
