PREPARING OURSELVES

Take a moment to be still in God's presence and feel his love. If you are indoors, you may wish to light a candle as a sign of God's love - here, in your room. You may also wish to have a bowl of water ready for the time of letting go. When you are ready, say this opening prayer.

O God, you search me and you know me.
All my thoughts lie open to your gaze.
You know the journeys that I take
and the places where I rest.
You know all that is on my heart,
every one of my worries.
Help me to let go of them,

for a while, as I spend time in your presence.

Amen.

LETTING GO

If you come to this time of prayer and reflection with any regrets, with things that you wish you had not said, done or been, offer them to God in the silence of your heart. And then, when you are ready, reflect on your life with the second verse from this week's hymn.

Startled at the solemn warning, let the earth-bound soul arise; Christ, her sun, all sloth dispelling, shines upon the morning skies.



If you wish, dip your finger into a bowl of water and make the sign of the cross on your palm.

Our second verse invites us to wake up! Spiritually speaking, our Lord is calling us to give our faith life an Advent refresh. With the sameness or the busyness of our daily lives, it is easy for our prayers and praise to go a little stale. Equally, our focus can narrow to where Jesus is today; what he is doing to save those in danger for their lives. Advent invites us to wake up and look to the future and prepare for Christ our King's return.

Take a moment to think about how you are feeling as Advent begins. On a scale of one to five, where one is running on empty and five is full to overflowing with joy and praise, how is your prayer life? And, your Bible guided walk with the Lord? What needs refreshing and revitalising? Lift this up to the Lord in prayer. Trust in his generous and self-giving love and compassion. His Spirit will provide what you are seeking.

PRAYING TODAY'S PRAYER (The Collect)

Today, this prayer is being said across our villages and the worldwide Church. Add your voice to the earthly circle of prayer to our Faithful One.

Almighty God,
as your kingdom dawns,
turn us from the darkness of sin
to the light of holiness,
that we may be ready to meet you
in our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Turning from the world's darkness towards the dawning light of hope is a core Advent image. We will see this in our Gospel reading as Jesus prepares his team for the end times. Waiting for the sunrise can seem endless for those who have had a sleepless night. It can't come too soon. For those who are sleeping soundly, the dawn of a new day can wait. We're too snug in bed... or in our way of life.

Our prayer is an invitation to re-kindle our desire for Christ's return, through prayer and reflection and studying the bible, and to take a fresh look at how we are living by the light of our faith. We need to be ready to greet Christ our King on his return. If he was to come tomorrow, would you or I be ready for this? Advent reminds us to ask this question daily!

Take a moment to think about your life... all that is filled with the holiness of Christ's love and compassion, and his passion for justice and fairness... and, be brave, all that is not quite as it should be... God's Spirit has the power to transform the dark corners of our lives. Open yourself to him.



So when next he comes with glory, wrapping all the earth in fear, may he then, as our defender, on the clouds of heaven appear.

LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

Keep awake!

Jesus said, 'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.

Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.

'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

Mark 13:24-end

Keep alert...

Jesus begins his Keep Awake speech by talking about the dramatic events which will happen in his team's lifetime. He is seeing into the near future, and, by quoting words of the prophet Isaiah, speaks of the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of its temple, and the political changes this will bring about for Jews and Christians alike. We also get a glimpse of the seismic changes that will flow from the Cross and the empty grave. Jerusalem will no longer be the primary place where God is found; Pentecost will set his Spirit free to roam the earth.

So, yes, these changes did come true in the present generation. But... there is more to come. Jesus will return. He will fulfil Daniel's vision of The Son of Man. It is such a beautiful and hope-filled vision of a world united under Christ our King. Gone will be all of the death, destruction and darkness of the present age. Our world will be as it should be.

As you ponder this, think about how this vision of Christ our King inspires the way that you live and reflect on world events. What is our Lord saying to you as Advent begins? How are you getting ready for this?


