LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

The New Commandment

When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Love one another...

It is Thursday evening. Judas has left the room to do what he has been paid to do - betray his friend - as Jesus speaks to the remaining eleven knowing his time is short. All of his teaching over the past three years is captured in this one simple yet challenging instruction.

> Love one another. Just as I have loved you... John 13:34

Gone will be the jockeying for position... wanting to be the greatest ones... gone will be the little hurts and slights that caused Peter to ask Jesus, 'Lord, how often should I forgive?'... all will be united in doing what Jesus will commission them to do - spread his good news. Or, that's the theory!

Building his church would not be without its challenges. There will be differences of opinion and issues to resolve. If they can work through these with love in their hearts, respecting each other's views, they will be able to create a church that people flock to join. For it will be a family of faith that looks and feels like Jesus. Love is how we think of Jesus. Love is what we see in his disciples as they build his church.

Think of last week's story of Peter and Tabitha. Peter saw how much the widows loved Tabitha, and how loving Tabitha had been to the widows, and he was moved to pray for her to be brought back to life. Why? Because love inspired him to do this.

Perhaps, you too have been inspired by love in the past week. May be, you have done a simple act of kindness. If so, recall how it felt to do this. You were radiating the love of Jesus... sharing his good news... causing others to wonder about why you do what you do.

As the disciples built the church to be as loving as Jesus, sometimes, God's Spirit called them to love beyond the limits of their own love, as we will hear in our reading from Acts.

All are welcome...

Peter recalls. "Recently I was praying in Joppa. I fell into a trance and saw a vision: Something like a huge blanket, lowered by ropes at its four corners, came down out of heaven and settled on the ground in front of me. Milling around on the blanket were farm animals, wild animals, reptiles, birds - you name it, it was there. Fascinated, I took it all in.

"Then I heard a voice: 'Go to it, Peter - kill and eat.' I said, 'Oh, no, Master. I've never so much as tasted food that wasn't kosher.' The voice spoke again: 'If God says it's okay, it's okay.' This happened three times, and then the blanket was pulled back into the sky.

"Just then three men showed up at the house where I was staying, sent from Caesarea to get me. The Spirit told me to go with them, no questions asked. So I went with them..." Acts 11:4-12 (The Message)

Peter's natural instinct is to be cautious about sharing the good news of Jesus with those outside of the Jewish faith. To his Jewish eyes, they are as unclean as the food that the Hebrew Scriptures forbid him from eating. He thinks that he should not accept invitations to go to their houses. God's Spirit opens his eyes. This vision shows him that God's love is without limits and Peter's should be too. All are welcome in God's church. All are loved by him. As you contemplate this second verse from today's hymn, think about where there are divisions and differences in your life... in the world... seek God's loving and wise guidance.
