Prayers and Reflections for use at home on The Epiphany Joy and Delight

PREPARING OURSELVES

Take a moment to be still in God's presence and feel his love. If you are indoors, you may wish to light a candle as a sign of God's love - here, in your room. You may also wish to have a bowl of water ready for the time of letting go. When you are ready, say this opening prayer.

Lord Jesus, like the wise men,
I have come to worship
and to offer you the gifts that I bring:
my gold of obedience,
my incense of lowliness,
and my myrrh of self-giving.
What I can I give,
my life and my love,
as I give thanks for your love. Amen.

LETTING GO

If you come to this time of prayer and reflection with any regrets, with things that you wish you had not said, done or been, offer them to God in the silence of your heart. And then, when you are ready, reflect on who God was revealed to be by the wise men.

If you wish, dip your finger into a bowl of water and make the sign of the cross on your palm.

Our second Epiphany verse speaks of the joy and delight and awe which the wise men will experience at being in our Lord's presence. Its words speak to their three gifts — Maker (Frankincense), Monarch (Gold) and Saviour (Myrrh). The first of these speaks to the enormity of our Lord's coming to us. We see this enormity in the opening words of John's Spirit-filled Gospel. May you experience the wise men's awe as you pause and contemplate yourself being in our Lord's infant presence.

PRAYING TODAY'S PRAYER (The Collect)

Today, this prayer is being said across our villages and the worldwide Church. Add your voice to the earthly circle of prayer to our God on high.

Creator of the heavens, who led the Magi by a star, to worship the Christ-child: guide and sustain us, that we may find our journey's end in Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Our prayer invites us to think of the star — God's creative way of awakening curiosity in the wise men. Its brightness invited the wise men to turn to their books. Why is this star here in the sky? What can be its message to us? It is an invitation to set out in search of a new king — a new-born king. Imagine how they were feeling as the star's meaning began to dawn on them. Feel their joy and delight!

A joy and delight that saw them packing their bags and setting out into the unknown with only God's star to guide them. Their regal gifts speak of who they are – where they come from – why they are seeking him. Frankincense and myrrh – spices from their homeland – and gold were very fitting gifts for a king. Gifts into which God will breathe new life – divine meaning. God spoke to the wise men through their gifts, increasing their joy and delight.

Ponder this as you contemplate this next verse. What will you offer to Christ our King? How will God increase your joy and delight as you praise his Son and offer your presents?



Say, shall we yield him, in costly devotion, odours of Edom, and offerings divine, gems of the mountain, and pearls of the ocean, myrrh from the forest, or gold from the mine?

LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

The Magi visit the Messiah

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, 'Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.'

When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. When he had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Messiah was to be born. 'In Bethlehem in Judea,' they replied, 'for this is what the prophet has written:

"But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel."'

Then Herod called the Magi secretly and found out from them the exact time the star had appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, 'Go and search carefully for the child. As soon as you find him, report to me, so that I too may go and worship him.'

After they had heard the king, they went on their way, and the star they had seen when it rose went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their country by another route.

Joy and delight...

As you journeyed with the wise men on the familiar path to see Jesus, the infant King, what emotions did you notice? **Eagerness** as the men were brought into the presence of the wrong king. Where is the King who will take your place? is the embarrassing question that they ask of the villainous Herod. **Joy** as they hear where the new king has been born. Off they set for Bethlehem. A final stage of 5 to 6 miles. The new king has been born such as short distance from Herod but a world away from his self-serving ways. **Delight** as they enter the right house — a humble, ordinary house not a grand palace like Herod's. **Awe** as they bowed down, knelt before the infant king, and offered their heart's treasures. These were the gifts that delighted the little Jesus (and still do).

And **shame** and **humility** as they left for home. I wonder, if the wise men felt shame at having made such a dangerous mistake in assuming that the new king had been born in a palace. Let down by their own wisdom, I sense that they would been humbled by their obvious limitations. God is wiser than them (and us)! I pray that God's grace and forgiveness were added to the joy and delight, and awe, that they had experienced during their visit to our Saviour King. For joy and delight were the lasting gifts God wanted to give these curious seekers of meaning.

Ponder the power of God's love and grace to wipe away the shame of past mistakes and his wisdom to fill our gaps. May joy and delight fill you with praise.

Lord Jesus, the wise men made a big mistake with huge consequences. It was a hard way to learn about the limitations of their own wisdom, and the infinite extent of your Father's. Fill with grace and hope, I pray... Lord, hear my prayer.

Offer your own heartfelt prayers and yearnings, praise and thanksgivings.
