#### LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

#### Our calling to serve

They went on from there and passed through Galilee. Jesus did not want anyone to know it; for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, 'The Son of Man is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he was saying and were afraid to ask him.

Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the way?' But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another about who was the greatest. He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, 'Whoever wants to be the first must be last of all and servant of all.' Then he took a little child and taking it in his arms, he said to them, 'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

Mark 9:30-37

#### Setting the scene

Shortly before this scene, Peter, James and John had accompanied Jesus up a mountain, where they witnessed Jesus' transfiguration as the Son of God, with Elijah and Moses either side of him. All three disciples are astounded by what they have witnessed and they are quite frightened, too. After this momentous event, they descend the mountain and re-join the other nine disciples.

In the first part of this week's Gospel reading, Jesus tries to explain to the disciples that he will be killed, but will rise again from the dead. However, the disciples are frightened by his words and do not really understand what he is telling them. Perhaps they are too busy arguing about who is the greatest amongst them?

When they reach Capernaum, Jesus wants to know what they have been arguing about. Maybe the disciples started arguing because only three of them were invited to accompany Jesus up the mountain? Perhaps they felt that they had not been treated equally; they may have felt left out or unimportant? Jesus points out to them that anyone who wants to be first, must be prepared to be last of all and be servant to all. What could he mean?

#### Our call to follow his example

Being or feeling more important than others, is not part of what it means to follow Christ. Jesus tells us that serving others is an important part of our discipleship. We need to put others before ourselves, as Jesus did. During the past year, ways of serving each other have changed a great deal. Shielding and self-isolation have thrown independent people into situations where they have had to rely on other people to do their shopping or collect their medication. This can be a real frustration when you want to be self-reliant. It is more difficult to serve others, if you are unexpectedly house-bound. Yet one way to look at this, is that when we accept care from others, we are actually blessing them. If we allow people to help us and thus bless them, then we are in fact serving them! There is a balance.



So let us learn how to serve, and in our lives enthrone him; each other's needs to prefer, for it is Christ we're serving.

Serving others need not be all about getting out and doing things for other people. Listening to others, either over the garden fence or on the telephone, is one way in which we can serve other people. It is surprising how much a cup of tea and a listening ear can really comfort and calm someone. Sharing your experience with people is also helpful, for example; baking, DIY, crafting or gardening tips can be supportive.

Wisdom gained from experience and shared with others, can save people from making mistakes or may help them to make difficult decisions. In Proverbs 3:17, it says that wisdom "will guide you down delightful paths"! Ecclesiastes 2:26 says "God gives wisdom, knowledge and joy to those who please him." It is surprising how offering to pray for other people can help to make them feel strengthened and comforted. These are some of the ways in which we can serve others, when practical ways are more difficult for us. God gives us different gifts and ways to serve, that can be adapted to our changing circumstances. Gentler ways of serving are just as important as more practical methods. Jesus tells us that we are all equal – no-one is more important than anyone else. Everyone can contribute to the well-being and care of others. No-one is forgotten.

Take a moment to think about how you may have blessed someone this week, without realising it. Perhaps you shared a cup of tea with someone and offered a moment of calm in their busy day? Maybe you listened to them about something that was worrying them or offered to pray for them? It is surprising how much this can help and support someone. There are no limits to the way we can offer comfort and love to others, just as there are no limits to God's love for us.
