He never, ever walks by on the other side of the road or fails to pick up our calls. Ponder his loving faithfulness with the help of this well-known poem of doubting and finding - Footprints.*

### The Parable of the Good Samaritan

On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he asked, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?'

'What is written in the Law?' he replied. 'How do you read it?'

He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind"; and, "Love your neighbour as yourself."

'You have answered correctly,' Jesus replied. 'Do this and you will live.'

But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?'

In reply Jesus said: 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he travelled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have."

'Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?'

The expert in the law replied, 'The one who had mercy on him.'

Jesus told him, 'Go and do likewise.'



## Love without borders...

*Some of the best Shakespeare plays and the best Verdi operas have been updated and set in modern times. Perhaps, the most famous of these is 'West Side Story' - a retelling of the feud between two families as a battle between two rival New York gangs. The story of the Good Samaritan can so easily be transposed into one of today's conflict zones. Samaritans didn't like or trust their neighbours, the Jewish Judeans, and the leaders and elders of the Jewish faith, plus the people too, treated Samaritans as unclean. They would not want to be seen in a Samaritan home or stop to give them vital first aid. It reminds me of the divisions between Israelis and Gazans.*

*Imagine Jesus re-telling the story today. The wounded man would be, perhaps, an injured soldier from the Israeli Defence Force lying on a road on leading out of Gaza to Israel. The priest could be one of the ultra-Orthodox Jews who strictly keep the Sabbath laws and believe this land is Israel's. The temple servant, I'd like to re-cast him as one of the politicians who believe in the righteousness of their actions. Their warmongering places their soldiers as well as Gazan civilians at risk. And, the Samaritan, he is easy to recast. Imagine one of the bereaved dads or starving mums passing by this wounded soldier on their way to get aid. Picture them stopping, tending to this man and lifting him onto their cart and then taking him to one of the last remaining functioning hospitals. It would be a love that crosses the bloodiest of borders. It would be a love that sees the humanity and hurt of those on the other side, and responds with compassion. This is our Lord's call to us - Go and do likewise.*
